Fiscal year 2014 was a year of expansion and excitement for us. Because of the incredible fundraising efforts of our volunteers, board members and donors, we almost doubled our income from fiscal year 2013.

In addition to a 94% increase in donations and grants received and continuous growth in dedicated volunteers around the country, we have retained three professional nonprofit consultants to guide us into the future with board development and strategic planning.

The benefit of giving to Grey Muzzle is that we make sure every dollar we give to our grantees goes directly to senior dogs and the program being funded. Grant money never funds staffing expenses, buildings, or other such administrative costs. We pride ourselves on being good stewards of our donors' money.

This report provides the details of the year's accomplishments, which are the culmination of the hard work and dedication of our board and volunteers. I am sure you will enjoy reading how your support helped to save so

many senior dogs around the country by helping us to extend our mission for those dogs.

Donors


The Grey Muzzle Organization is grateful to the more than 850 individuals and businesses that made donations during fiscal year 2014. Donations are critical to our success, and thanks to our generous donors, revenues increased to over \$185,000—a new record for us!

Grants and Other Programs

In fiscal year 2014, The Grey Muzzle Organization was able to provide \$119,000 in grants to 42 rescue groups and shelters in 22 states across the country. Grantees go through a rigorous selection process and Grey Muzzle thoroughly researches and assesses the organizations and programs that are selected. Once a grant is awarded, the grantee must sign a contract before receiving funding, and, towards the conclusion of the one-year grant period, the grantee must submit a detailed report on how the money was used. We do this research on behalf of our donors to ensure funds are used in the most effective way.

Additionally, The Grey Muzzle Organization provides orthopedic beds for homeless senior dogs in shelters. In fiscal year 2014, the Grey Muzzle provided over \$15,000 worth of beds to organizations across the country.

By pooling together donations, we are able to make significant contributions to some of the best senior dog programs around the country. We are proud to report a program ratio (the percentage of total expenses devoted to programs and services) of 94% for fiscal year 2014.
